In June, the 2023 ESCO Technologies Foundation scholarships were awarded. ESCO Corporate Summer Giving Program

This summer ESCO Corp is supporting local charities suggested by our employees. Each month we are supporting a different charity, starting in June with Webster-Rock Hill Ministries (WRHM). WRHM partners with and assists those in need, while offering services to empower them to pursue resolutions to their present circumstances. ESCO is supporting their food pantry by collecting and providing non-perishable food items, personal care products and household supplies. In recognition of our employee donations and the important work that WRHM does in our community, the Foundation contributed a \$1.000 donation.

All employees who contributed were entered into a drawing for an ESCO backpack filled with goodies including Cardinals tickets, a Stanley Tumbler, a Starbucks gift card, and some adult beverages.

The organization has been so grateful for the new involvement of the Foundation, as they have experienced a downturn in summer donations. We plan to organize an in-service event to assist with food distribution in the future and to continue to support their local efforts close to the ESCO Corporate office.

ETS-Glendale Heights



Habitat works together with families, local communities, volunteers and partners from around the world, so that more people are able to live in affordable and safe homes. Habitat builds homes in partnership with families. Homebuyers help build their own homes alongside volunteers and then pay an affordable mortgage. The labor of volunteers and partner families, efficient building methods, modest house sizes, and no-profit loans make it affordable for low-income families to purchase Habitat houses.

Habitat for Humanity Lake County was established in 1989 and has helped over 200 families, providing permanent housing for almost 900 people. Dustin Goffron from ETS-Lindgren in Glendale Heights, Illinois has served as a Board Member of Habitat Lake County since 2016. Initially, the Foundation supported his efforts with grants through our Miscellaneous Giving Program. This program provides grants of up to \$1,000 to support organizations in which our employees are personally involved. In 2022, Dustin became Vice President of the Board and ETS-Lindgren elevated Habitat Lake County to a core charity with a \$5,000 grant.
